The bride is the daughter of **Mr. and Mrs. H. Beach** old settlers and highly respected citizens of Footville. The groom is the young businessman and postmaster of our village and a partner with his father **J.F. Litel** in a large and well kept general store.

Mrs. Nattie Butterfield, daughter of Uncle Gilbert Dolson and sister of Mrs. G. W. Bartlett who has been visiting friends and relatives here for five or six weeks, started Tuesday morning for her home in Beloit, Kansas.

Samuel Gilbertson and Olive Jacobson both of Albany, were married in Orfordville on Thursday, Jan. 12 by Rev. T.K. Thorvildsen.

Albany Vindicator, Feb. 2, 1888

Another link has been broken in the fast shortening chain of time honored citizens known as the old settlers. **Albert S. Holmes** died suddenly at the residence of his son V.C. Holmes in Evansville on Friday, Jan. 27 of paralysis of the heart. He had been ill for several months. Mr. Holmes was born in Petersburg, Rensselaer County, New York on Feb. 10, 1820 where he lived until 1844 when he came to Wisconsin and purchased a farm a few miles southeast of this village where he lived until his death. On July 26,

1846, he married Sarah A. Cass, whose former home was in Rensselaer County, New York. Besides the bereaved wife the deceased leaves one daughter and three sons to mourn her loss. All are married and comfortably settled in life. Their names are Mary F., Ezra S., Vivus C., and Lee G. Holmes, the last of whom has always lived on the old homestead with his parents. Mr. Holmes was one of the most honest, upright men to be found in this country and one of the few who continued living to the age of 68 without making an enemy. The funeral services which was largely attended was held at the home of the deceased on Monday and a very appropriate sermon preached by Rev. Jas. Jameson of Magnolia, an aged minister of the Gospel. His remains were followed to their last resting place in the Albany Cemetery by 33 cutter and sleigh loads of mourning friends and relatives. For his many good qualities, Mr. Holmes will long be remembered by all who knew him.

Albany Vindicator, Feb. 23, 1888

Mrs. Jeanette Beattie died at her home in this village on Tuesday, Feb. 21 after a lingering illness in the 73rd year of her age. The deceased was born in Aberlindie, Scotland on July 30, 1815. She was married in 1839 to William Beattie and in 1848 they came to America. The family resided for a number of years at or near the village of Juda. Her husband, William Beattie, died in the year 1878. Their union was blessed with nine sons and daughters, six of whom survive her. For the past five years, Mrs. Beattie has made her home with her son Charles, who is in the employ of the C.M. and St. Paul Railway and her daughter Nettie Beattie, residents of our village. During her last painful illness of several weeks duration, she was cared for by her son Charles and daughter Nettie and for the past two weeks or more another daughter, Mrs. Agnes Trembly of Kansas City, had assisted at her bedside. David Beattie who had been paying a last visit to his mother for the first part of this month, returned soon after to his home in Sterling, Colorado. Mrs. Beattie had ever been a devoted Christian and was held in high esteem among neighbors and friends. The funeral services were held at the residence of the deceased on Wednesday at 10:30, Rev. Jas. Lawson delivering an appropriate sermon. At the conclusion of the services, the funeral cortege escorted the remains to the cemetery at Juda where they were consigned to a place of rest beside the companion of her former years.

Attica: The funeral of Mrs. T. Wright took place at Exeter on Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Wright was an honest, upright woman. She leaves a husband and six children to mourn her loss: Mrs. Maria Mathems of Albany, Miss Bessie Wright, Mrs. Elie(?) Loucks, James Wright, Sam and little Guy.

Death has again visited our friends and this time taken Mrs. Elizabeth Wright, wife of Timothy Wright who lived only a couple miles west of Attica in the town of Exeter.

She breathed her last on Saturday morning, Feb. 25 after an illness of only ten days in the 46th year of her age. Mrs. Wright, whose maiden name was **Hayden**, was born in the state of Indiana on March 26, 1842 but came to this state with her parents Mr. and MRs. James Hayden, while she was yet a child and for many years has lived near the home where she died. In 1858 she married Timothy Wright who together with their six sons and daughters now mourn the loss of a kind and indulgent wife and mother. The funeral services held Sunday were largely attended by sorrowing friends and relatives who listened to an able and appropriate sermon preached by Rev. William Rowe of Monticello after which her remains were laid away in the cemetery near their home. Mrs. Wright will long be remembered for her uniform kindness and kind disposition and by the host of friends whe has made during her lifetime.

Mrs. Emory Dunbar of Footville shot herself with her husband's revolver on the evening of Feb. 23. The ball passed through her body from side to side. Mrs. Dunbar had been in ill health for some time and is said to have been a little deranged at the time. Later reports announce that she died from the effects of the wound.

Albany Vindicator, March 8, 1889

Miss Nellie Rafter died at the home of her mother in this village on Thursday evening, March 1. She was born in Janesville on Sept. 23, 1858 but has lived in this village evern since. Her father, James Rafter, was buried in Janesville in 1863. Besides a kind and sorrowing mother, she leaves one sister, Kate, now Mrs. John Hamer of Kingsley Iowa and two brothers, Frank (who is also in Iowa) and the faithful, kind hearted Isaac now in the employ of the C.M. & St. Paul Railway Company. Nellie was a free hearted girl who was a friend to everyone and all who knew here were friends of hers and who now feel keenly the loss of their friend. The funeral service was held on Saturday afternoon in the M.E. Church and was largely attended by friends and acquaintances. An appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. W.T. Hill and her remains interred in the cemetery on the west side of the river.

Mrs. Mary Eastman who lived on a farm in the town of Decatur not far from the Gap Church, died suddenly on Saturday, March 3 of hemorrhage of the brain. Mrs. Eastman whose maiden name was Bump, was born in New Hampshire on Nov. 3, 1822 and married George Bump (transcriber's note, this might have been a printer's error, it might have been meant to be George Eastman) in 1841. They came to Wisconsin in 1856 and settled on the farm on which she so suddenly died. The deceased leaves an aged mother who feels deeply the loss of her dutiful daughter. The funeral was held in the Gap Church on Sunday and an excellent sermon preached by Rev. W.T. Hill in the presence of a large congregation which assembled to pay their last respects to one so highly esteemed. Her remains were laid to rest in the family lot near the church by the side of her husband who had gone before.

Albany Vindicator, March 15, 1888

Grace Estella, the beloved daughter of J.F. and E.A. Maynard, was born in Albany on April 25, 1871 and died at the same place March 12, in the 17th year of her age. In her short life she manifested many commendable traits of character. She was eager and persevering in her efforts to obtain a liberal education; just as long as she was able, she was present in her class at school and when unable to attend endeavored for a short time to keep up her studies at home. She became identified with and a worker in about all the young people's societies existing here which are seeking the intelligent and moral elevation of the youth. She was especially a lover of music and sacred songs. In January, 1887, she united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in Albany and on the following July was baptized and received as a fully accredited member of the church. She has been faithful to all the public and more private means of grace since her conversion up to the time of her illness even in stormy or unpleasant weather she seldom was absent from the weekly prayer meeting. A little over a year ago she resolved to read the Bible through by course and at the time of her death had almost finished the pleasant task. She kept a record of all texts she heard preached from and on two occasions being detained from attending the service she asked her pastor what the texts were and remarked "I would have liked to have heard the sermon". Her confinement at home by sickness was comparatively short; towards the close, however, the earthly tabernacle was taken down quite rapidly. She assured me but a few days before her death that, living or dying, all was well and at last passed away most peacefully. The funeral was held at the M.E. Church on Wednesday forenoon and attended by a large concourse of people. The church was appropriately draped and supplied with a profusion of choice flowers, two beautiful bouquets having been sent by the Equal Rights Club of Brodhead. The services were conducted by Rev. Jas. Lawson, assisted by Rev. W.T. Hill. At the close of the service the Albany Equal Rights Suffrage Society of which Gracie was a member, arose in a body to take a last look at their departed sister and as they passed each lady carefully laid on the casket a beautiful flower in token of their friendship. In the death of **Hon. Marvin Osborne** of the town of Magnolia which occurred on Monday evening, March 5, society lost an honest, upright and exemplary citizen and the people among whom he lived lost an obliging neighbor and his family a kind and indulgent parent. Mr. Osborne was born in Lenox, Madison County, New York on January 22, 1917. He came to Wisconsin in 1848 and first settled in Dodge County but since 1860 he has been a resident in Magnolia, Rock County. He was twice elected to the Assembly in 1873 and again in 1874 and was a member during the memorable struggle between the people and the corporation which resulted in what is known as the "Potter Law". Among those who withstood the powerful influence of those great moneyed corporations and remained true to the people, Hon. Marvin Osborne's name will ever remain prominent. He was a man of strict integrity, of unblemished character whose very presence in the legislative body was a rebuke to schemers, tricksters, and public plunderers. He had been in ill health for some time but was finally taken with pneumonia which soon terminated in death while four other members of his house lay sick. Scarcely had his mortal remains been consigned to the grave when his wife closed her eyes to wake no more. Mr. Osborne died on Monday evening and Mrs. Osborne who had taken the same disease, died on Thursday morning. Thus companions in life for more than 46 years were not long separated by death. Mrs. Osborne's maiden name was Annie

Palmer, a native of Chautauqua County, New York and was married to Mr. Osborne while both were resident of that state. She was 66 years of age at the time of her death. She was spoken of as a woman of great moral worth, kind and generous and highly respected by all who knew her. Two sons and one daughter remain to mourn the loss of their parents. The moral remains of those good people were laid to rest in the cemetery at Evansville in a lot previously purchased by Mr. Osborne, Mr. D. Osborne and wife were constantly at the bedside of his parents until death relieved them of their suffering. Now, on their return home, Mrs. Osborne is stricken down with the same disease and is in a very critical condition.

William Flood of Dayton, was married to Miss Mary O'Donnell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John O'Donnell of Monticello at St. Rose's Catholic Church in Brodhead on Wednesday, April 25 at 9:00 am, Rev. Father Kelly officiating. Miss Kate O'Donnell and M.W. O'Donnell, sister and brother of the bride, acted as bridesmaid and groomsman. A wedding supper was served at the home of the bride's parents. The happy couple will now make their home in Blue Mounds, Wisconsin.

Albany Vindicator, June 28, 1888

Sarah Atkinson, consort of Frank Atkinson and whose maiden name was Jones, was born in Radnorshire, Wales on May 22, 1838 and died of paralysis in Albany on Monday morning, June 25. She came from Wales to America in 1844 with her parents. In her 17th year she was saved and united with the church. At the age of 22 she married her now bereft companion. To them were born 11 children, three of whom while quite young were transported from this vain world to happy glory. Eight children, 3 boys and 5 girls are still living with their father without a mother's blessing, prayers and care. At her

marriage she was a member of the Primitive Methodist Church. After her marriage she joined the church to which her husband belonged, fully uniting her destiny with his. For 28 years they walked the journey of life together sharing each other's joys and sorrows. As a faithful mother to her children she was pre-eminent, no toil was too much, no sacrifice too great if she could thereby help. Although living some distance from church and having the care of a large family, she was always ready and willing to help in church work and by her hearty manner indicated that it was a pleasure for her to do what she could for the Master. Her death doubtless came to her as to all as unexpected.
