The many friends of Myra Bump were shocked and grieved to learn of her death which occurred on Wednesday, March 20 at 1:00 pm. Myra Alice Bump was the only daughter of Henry C. and Melvina Fleek Bump and was born in Allen County, Kansas on Sept. 29, 1872. She was the second child and her three brothers survive her. When she was two years old her parents removed to Jordan Prairie, Wisconsin where they still reside. Myra was a most lovable girl, a dutiful daughter and a warm and sincere friend. She was a quiet and while her friends esteemed her highly and loved her very much, her influence for good was far greater than they imagined and it is only now that she is gone that they fully realize how great her influence was. Her death was a triumphant one and her last hours were spent in comforting comforting the loved ones around her and in sending messages of love to her classmates and friends. Less than a week before her death she was taken sick with pneumonia and while the attack was not of the most acute character her constitution was not strong enough and she was unable to throw it off and her heart became afflicted and she died of heart failure. The funeral was a most impressive one and took place from the Gap church on Friday morning, March 22, Rev. R.N. Martin of Albany officiating. A very large number of sorrowing friends attended but the way in which she passed away, the loving messages she left behind and the whole character of her life was most comforting.

## Albany Vindicator, April 18, 1889

Died, at her home on Jordan Prairie, on April 11, after a few days illness, **Mrs. Dorothy Bump** in her 86<sup>th</sup> year. The deceased was born in Massachusetts on Dec. 13, 1803. She came to Wisconsin with her husband and family in 1856 and was left a widow the following year. She was the mother of seven children, three of whom died in infancy and one a widowed daughter died very suddenly about a year ago. Two daughters and a son

survive her. The deceased was for more than 30 years a member of the Baptist Church at the Gap. Her whole trust was in her Savior. She was noted for her cheerfulness and industry and could not be contented unless she was employed. Even in her sleep during her sickness her mind was actively at work counting stitches and making lace, the knitting of which, both as to quantity and quality, she was noted. She retained the use of her faculties to the last and came to her grave in good old age with an unblemished reputation, respected by all, like a shock of corn coming in its season, fully ripe and ready for heavenly gain.

# Albany Vindicator, June, 1889

The many friends of **Katie Hall** were shocked to learn of her death which occurred last week and seldom has the death of any one so young elicited such general regret and sorrow as hers did in the community in which she lived. She was the daughter of Mr. **J.D. Hall** of Juda and was born in Juda on Nov. 30, 1871. When she was quite young her parents removed to Missouri and most of her life was spent there but after her mother's death she came to reside and made her home with her uncle, Erastus Hulburt, where she died on June 22, aged 17 years, 6 months. Katie was an ambitious girl. It was her aim in life to fit herself for teaching and she strove hard to prepare herself for it but in so doing overtaxed a constitution which was never very strong and for the past three years had been in failing health but was not seriously ill until quite recently when she was forced to give up her school and faded quite rapidly until she died from hasty consumption. Her death was a Christian triumph. While at all times patient and thoughtful of others, during her last illness she was somewhat restless until she was told her disease would be fatal and that she had not long to live; then she became calm and resigned and had firm trust and bright hope. She passed peacefully away on Saturday morning. She leaves a father and brother. On Sunday morning, June 23 a short service was held at her late home, the residence of Erastus Hulburt and was conducted by Rev. R.N. Martin of the Gap Church. After a brief service the remains were followed by a large number of friends and were taken to Juda where the funeral service was held in the Baptist Church of which she was a member, Rev. J. Andereck officiating. She was then laid to rest in the cemetery at Juda.
