Albany Vindicator, Jan. 16, 1896

Albany Vindicator, Jan. 23, 1896

Mrs. P.C. Wessel attended the funeral of her niece Miss Irma Humstreet at Monticello last Friday.

Clayton Smith and Lizzie Gill both of Brooklyn were married at the home of the bride's parents on Jan. 15.

Died, at her home in Magnolia on Jan. 1, 1896 of nervous prostration, **Mrs. Harriett Bartlett**, aged 68. Less than a week before she had returned from a visit to her daughter **Mrs. Warren Howard** at Marshalltown, Iowa and her death coming so suddenly was a great shock to her relatives and friends. Mrs. Howard was sick and unable to be present at the funeral. Mrs. Barrett was a quiet, Christian woman, seldom away from her home. She leaves two daughters and one son bereft of a mother's care and love.

Married, at the 2nd Presbyterian Church in Colorado Springs, Colorado, on Wed., Jan. 15, **F.J. Plimpton** of Colorado Springs to **Belle Edwards** formerly of this city. Mr. Plimpton is the proprietor of the largest grocery and provision store in Colorado Springs. The bride is well known in Albany having resided here for a number of years before removing with her parents about four years ago.

Albany Vindicator, Feb. 13, 1896

Died, at her home near Attica in the town of Mt. Pleasant, on Saturday, Feb. 1, **Mrs. Marinda (Loveland) Silver**, aged 92 years, 5 months and 20 days. Her father was **Andrus Loveland** and was of English descent. He died on Sept. 20, 1869 in his 97th year. He was four times married and had 22 children. **Argalus Loveland**, half brother to Mrs. Silver, residing in the town of Washington, is the only living child. He is nearly 82 years old. He was not strong enough to attend his sister's funeral. Her mother, **Rachel (Bates) Loveland** was the mother of 9 children. She died when Marinda was 5. Mrs. Silver was born in Middlefield, Hampshire County, Massachusetts on Aug. 11, 1803. She was married to **Christopher Silver** March 2, 1820 in Erie County, Pennsylvania. They came to Wisconsin in 1845 and settled on the farm where she died. She was idolized by her husband who on August 3, 1881 was called to his eternal home. The disease of which she died was paralysis; for the 13 years past she has been quite helpless. Her youngest daughter Ann lived with her and surely no daughter is ever more kindly or gave more undying care to a loving mother. Her husband and six children wait for her in the "better land". The living children are **Sarah Fulton** of Wausau, Wisconsin; **Artemus** of Albany; **Azariah** of Holdredge, Nebraska; **Willis** of Emporia, Kansas; **Clarissa Brown** of Carbondale, Kansas; **Ann** of Attica; and **Alonzo** who lives near the

homestead and since his father's death had seen to every want of his mother's home. They are left to mourn their loss.

came to Green County in 1842 and has been identified with its history ever since. He held at different times various public offices of honor and trust and had the confidence and esteem of the community.

William Webb of this city received a telegram last Friday night announcing that his brother **Robert** who resided at Richland Center had committed suicide. A letter stated that he had been in poor health for several years and finally became so despondent over the fact that on the 24th inst., he went to his barn and cut his throat seven times with a butcher knife and was dead when found. Deceased was about 64 years of age and leaves a wife and several children.

It appears that he drove upon the track some distance until his horse got caught in a bridge and failing to extricate the animal, he crossed the bridge and attempted to signal the train but was not seen by the engineer until it was too late to stop. He was about 70 years of age.

The funeral of **Otto Asmus** was held at the German Church in Jug Prairie near his late home Sunday. Deceased was a member of the M.W.A. and was buried under the auspices of that fraternity. Members of the order from Sugar River Camp who attended were **Jas. Fulton, Jas. Whinery, Charles Comstock, Fred Albrecht, C.W. Baker and Herman Popanz**.

Alfred Campbell son of Charles Campbell, so well known in Albany, was a Sunday visitor in Albany. He resides at Binghampton, New York but is now on his way to Miles City, Montana where he has important business interests.

Balz Kundert, carpenter at New Glarus, committed suicide by blowing the top of his head off with a gun last week. He was 50 years old and leaves a family.

Howard Lanning of Stoughton also killed himself by shooting himself in the breast. He was 50 years of age and leaves a wife and six children.

Mrs. Mary Snyder was killed instantly and **Miss Myrta Silverthorn** mortally injured by a train while driving across a track at Footville Tuesday afternoon. A hard hail storm prevented them seeing or hearing the train. Miss Silverthron was an intimate friend of **Miss May Litel** of this city. The victims of the accident reside in the town of Center in Rock County.

Luke Bartlett, a young son of Emmett Bartlett of Brodhead died Monday. The young man recently visited here

and seemed in good health. The funeral was held yesterday, Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Bartlett, Mrs. Emma Bartlett and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hevri of this city attending.

Mrs. Lucinda Berry Libby died at Evansville aged 87 years. "Mother" Libby was born in Maine in 1809 and remained in that state until 1855 when she came west to Wisconsin.
