Albany Vindicator, Jan. 3, 1901

Miss Nettie Cleveland died at her home in Albany early Sunday morning Feb. 17 after three weeks illness. She was born in Beloit on Sept. 23, 1877 and had just entered the prime of life when the Death Angel appeared. She leaves a father and four sisters and a large number of friends to mourn their loss. The funeral was held at the home Tuesday afternoon Feb. 19, Elder E.P. Graves officiating and the remains interred in the Attica Cemetery.

Albany Vindicator, March 14, 1901

Mrs. John Kittelson died at her home northwest of Albany last Thursday morning, aged 24 years. She had been in poor health for several months but her last illness was brief. She was the daughter of **Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Dooley** of Mt. Pleasant and married Mr. Kittleson a little over three years ago. Two children were born to them both of whom preceded their mother to the better land. Besides the bereaved husband and relatives a host of friends mourn her early demise. The funeral was held at the Catholic Church in this city on Saturday.

Franklin Sanford Flint, youngest son of Joshua and Sally A. Flint was born in Albany on April 8, 1870 and died at his residence on the homestead three miles northeast of Albany on Tuesday, March 12, aged 30 years 10 months and 22 days. His death was due to a complication of mumps and the grippe. His condition had been considered dangerous but on Sunday he was much better. A relapse, however, carried him off. Frank was a cordial, whole-souled young man, popular with all who knew him and his death came as a shock to the entire community. On November 20, 1892 he married **Maude E. Lewis** who with a little daughter seven years of age, his aged mother, one brother, one sister and many relatives and friends mourn their loss. The funeral was held at the Baptist Church today at 2:00, services conducted by Rev. Joseph Mountain, formerly a pastor of the Albany Baptist Church. Rev. Mountain conducted the funeral of the late **Joshua Flint** and was held in high esteem by the deceased. The local camp of Modern Woodmen of which Mr. Flint was an honored member turned out in a body and had charge of the funeral.

Miss Harriett A. Bagley was born in Albany on Feb. 7, 1850 and has spent the greater part of her life here. She passed away March 25. At the age of 15 she united with the Monticello Prairie Baptist Church of which she remained a consistent and faithful member until the time of her death. She leaves an aged mother, two brothers and many friends to mourn her loss. The funeral was held from the family residence Wednesday afternoon, Rev. C.D. Mayhew conducting the services and the remains interred in the cemetery at the Monticello Prairie Baptist Church.

William Wesley Truax died at the home of his daughter Mrs. Alta Hill in Mt. Pleasant on Tuesday, March 25, aged 79 years, 5 months and 22 days. Mr. Truax was born in Nelson County, Kentucky in 1821. The following year his parents removed to Indiana and five years later to Vermillion County, Illinois. In 1844 he came to Green County and settled on the farm upon which his son **Eugene** now lives. He was married on May 26, 1845 to **Sarah Jane Whitesett** who died July 25, 1848. He again married on April 10, 1851 to **Elizabeth Sires**, who passed away August 11, 1853. His third wife was **Emily Whitesett** to whom he was married on November 7, 1857 and she died on Dec. 27, 1880. Mr. Truax had a stroke of paralysis about four years ago and never fully recovered from it. A last stroke occurred last Thursday which caused his death. He is survived by six children one by each of his first two wives and four by the last. Five children preceded him to the better world. Funeral services are being held at his late home today, conducted by Rev. C.D. Mayhew and the remains will be interred in the Truax Cemetery.

Lloyd E. Webb, twin son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Webb, died at the hotel in Sumner, Iowa on March 16 and was buried March 18 near their home. He was born on Sept. 15, 1900. He had capillary bronchitis complicated with spinal meningitis.

He went home a week ago Saturday to help his father with his farm work and while there was taken sick. He was a young man of the most excellent habits and held in high esteem by all who knew him. The funeral was today.

Albany Vindicator, July 11, 1901

Edward Jones was born in Montgomeryshire, North Wales on Jan. 5, 1815 and was married to **Jane Williams** on Sept. 5, 1853. In June of 1855 together with his wife he left his native land and came to America. He settled in the town of Albany where he resided up until the time of his death which occurred at the family home at noon on Saturday, July 6 aged 86 years, 6 months and 1 day. Deceased was the father of five children, four sons and one daughter. The eldest son was **Edward**, who died about 19 years ago. The daughter **Ann is the wife of Seymour Purinton**. **Oliver is married to Laura Bubb and David and George** are living with their mother on the old homestead. Funeral services were held at the family residence Sunday, July 7 at 2:00 pm conducted by Elder E.P. Graves. The remains were taken to the Albany cemetery for interment followed by a large number of friends who sympathized with the bereaved family in this their hour of mourning.

Disappointed in love, **J.U. Fruch**, a cheese maker employed by **Paul Schraepfer** on the old Dalyrmple farm a mile and a half east of Dayton committed suicide Sunday evening. Fruch had been keeping company with one of Schraepfer's daughters and on the 4th she attended a dance with an old fellow and he was going back to see her on Sunday evening. Fruch and the girl were milking between six and seven o'clock and Fruch asked the girl if he might see her that evening. He was given an unsatisfactory answer, she refusing to go with him any longer and when he finished milking he bade her goodbye. He went to the factory and blew off the top of his head with a shotgun. He was found dead on the floor of the packing room. An inquest was held on Monday afternoon, the jury agreeing that it was a plain case of suicide. Fruch was a member of the Concordia lodge I.O.O.F. #124 of Monroe. The remains were taken there and buried in the lot of the lodge. Fruch ws born April 20, 1873 in Canton, Appenzril, Switzerland where his mother, two sisters and a brother reside. The lodge has possession of his trunk and belongings and will notify relatives.

Friday, July 10 was the Golden Wedding Anniversary of **Elder and Mrs. E.P. Graves**. They did not intend any formal celebration of the event but their children and grandchildren happily surprised them early in the day and proceeded to make it an occasion of rejoicing and merry making. They succeeded admirably and made it a day to be long remembered. Those present were **Reuben Graves and wife** of Oregon; **Fred Graves and family and Earnest Graves** of Fulton; **Mrs. Florence Anthony, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Ellis** of Rutland; **Mrs. Hugh Roberts** of Brooklyn; **Mrs. Ava Murray** of Endeavor; **F.E. Graves** and family of Albany. A big dinner was

served at noon. Two handsome fancy rocking chairs were presented the elder and his wife as mementoes of the occasion.

Sunday night the farm house of **Armon Armonson**, three miles north of New Glarus, was burned to the ground. Mrs. Armonson and a crippled 8 year old son perished in the flames. The fire started in the sitting room and the family slept in rooms upstairs. They were not awakened until the stairs were burned away. Two boys jumped out of a window.

A.B. Hightshoe of Sigourney, Iowa, is paying a visit to relatives in this vicinity. Mr. Hightshoe's parents live in Sylvester in an earlier day, removing to Missouri in 1865. He is a nephew of the late **C.W. Burns** and brother of **Mrs. Margaret Fleek** of Brodhead.

Albany Vindicator, August 8, 1901

Dr. John Holden Warren Aug. 23, 1825 to August 1, 1901 Dr. J.H. Warren, a pioneer resident of this state, a former state senator and for many years prominent in the business and political life of this county and of the state, died at Palmyra Springs Thursday morning of cerebral embolism. He has been a sufferer from nervous trouble for the past ten years. His death was sudden, he having retired in his usual health Wednesday night after enjoying a days visit with Stanley B. Smith and wife of Janesville. John H. Warren was 76 years of age. He was born in Hogansburg, Franklin Company, New York on Aug. 23, 1825. He was of a splendid family. His grandfather served in the Revolutionary War and his father was a descendant of the New England Warrens and was a soldier in the War of 1812. John Warren came west when he was a young boy and came directly to Rock County. He came by the way of Johnstown and settled in La Prairie. In 1838 he came to Janesville and attended the first school taught there. At the age of 20 he studied medicine with Dr. Nichols of Janesville and afterwards with Dr. Dwyer of Chicago and graduated with honors from Rush Medical College in 1849. He was the last surviving member of his class and also the last living senator of the early days. Dr. Warren began the practice of medicine at Lodi where he resided until 1851 when he removed to Albany and followed the milling and mercantile business with much success. He was elected to state senator in 1857 and served for five years winning distinction as a statesman. In 1862 he was appointed by Abraham Lincoln as collector of internal revenue, an office he held for seven years. He was also appointed receiver of commutations by Secretary Stanton during the rebellion. He was a stockholder and director of the Sugar River Valley Railway and was for many years the largest mail contractor in the U.S. having over 100 mail routes and being president and general manager of the Western Stage Co., his business taking him to all of the remote places of the country giving him unusual opportunity to study the character of the Indians and in the early days he was one of the strongest advocates of a peace policy towards them. He was for several years vice president of the Wisconsin State Agricultural Society and an enthusiastic worker for the success of that association. He gave to Albany in its infancy his best efforts. In 1880 he worked with untiring effort to build the Sugar River Valley Railroad making many trips to Milwaukee and New York, conferring with officials, laboring unceasingly until the railroad was completed. He always had the best interests of Albany at heart and was ever ready to assist in promoting the interests of the town. In 1879 he removed to Janesville with his family where he resided until 1891 when he removed to Milwaukee. Throughout his public life he gained a reputation for enterprise coupled with that more commendable and rarer element of sterling integrity which served to give him a prominent position among the representative men of the state. In politics he was a republican having been a Whig in early days. He was always a firm believer in zealous work in the cause of intemperance. Dr. Warren was a loving and indulgent husband and father. He was ever ready with money or influence to help those in need or worthy of assistance. He was reared under Presbyterian influence and although not connected with any church organization he was a firm believer in the principle of Christianity and always

adhered to the doctrines taught him by his mother. His life is a grand sermon in itself. His remains were brought to Albany Saturday morning and placed in the family vault. After the Episcopal services were conducted by Rev. A.H. Barrington of Christ Church, Janesville, the beautiful Masonic services were conducted by the Albany Lodge 36 of which the deceased was a charter member and former master, assisted by the Brodhead lodge. Dr. Warren leaves a wife, **three daughters Julia, Gertrude and Louise** and two **sons Dr. Herbert N. and Dr. Benjamin H. Warren, two daughters Fannie and Elizabeth** having preceded him to the world unknown. Dr. Warren's honesty and integrity was rewarded by success in business interests and he leaves a valuable estate.

Peter McGovern, a well known resident of Rock County, died at his home in the town of Magnolia on Saturday morning after 7 months of intense suffering which he bore bravely and patiently. Deceased was born in Rock County in December of 1864 and his 36 years of life were spent in his native county. He was widely known and highly esteemed. A wife and child are deprived of his protection and care. He is also survived by 3 sisters: **Mrs. S. Kingman and Mrs. E.F. Marshall** of Janesville and **Mrs. P.H. Keegan** of Chicago. Funeral services were held from the Catholic Church on Monday and interment was in the Catholic cemetery.

Marietta (Maxon) Howard was born in Rensselaer County, New York on June 21, 1839 and died at Albany on Aug. 14, aged 62 years. She was married on Feb. 10, 1856 to **William Henry Howard** who died in 1886. Nine children were born to them four of whom have passed into the great beyond. Mr. Howard was a member of the M.E.
