William Butts and Erva Trow, both of Brooklyn, were united in marriage on Tuesday evening, Jan. 12 at the M.E. Church parsonage in this city by Rev. T.E. Foss.

Frank Alder, a farmer in the township of Jordan, committed suicide Friday afternoon by cutting his throat with a razor. He lived for some time after the act. He had been a cheese maker and had only moved three days previous from Brodhead to the farm which he recently bought. He was 45 years old.

E.T. McClure, landlord of the Young House in Brodhead, has become temporarily insane from the use of morphine and was taken to the Mendota Hospital Friday. **Mike Broderick** of Brodhead has been placed in charge of the hotel.

Died, at Albany on Friday, Jan. 15, Mary, wife of John Rafter. Mrs. Mary Rafter, whose maiden name was Mary O'Donnell, was born in County Tipperary, Ireland in 1825 and came to Albany with her parents at the tender age of four, settling at Troy, New York where she grew to womanhood. She moved to Janesville with her parents in 1850 and married John Rafter in 1853 and they made their home there for a few years. They then moved to McGregor, Iowa where Mr. Rafter died in 1863. Mrs. Rafter, with her family, then moved to Albany where she has since made her home. Five children were born of the union—Kate, now Mrs. John Hamer of Chester Iowa; Frank of Chester, Iowa; Isaac of Green Bay, Wisconsin; two daughters—Mary, wife of Will Finn and Nellie R. preceded her to the great beyond. The deceased was well and favorably known here. The funeral was held from the Catholic Church in Albany and was largely attended by a host of sorrowing friends and relatives. The pallbearers were nephews of Mrs. Rafter.

Mrs. A.E. Fleek passed away at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Lewis, in this village about 3:00 Monday afternoon, Feb. 1, 1904. While her death was not unexpected, the shock to the family and many relatives and friends was none the less. Mrs. Fleek had been in poor health the past three years and a number of times it was thought she could not possibly survive but her indomitable will and fortitude kept her alive till her tired nature could no longer do battle against our common enemy. Some weeks ago it was evident that her days were numbered and she was brought from the handsome family home to that of her parents where she could have the best nursing care that several hearts could give. Anticipating her death by some months, she had written her requests as to the place of holding the funeral, selecting the bearers, the hymns to be sung and the pastor to conduct the services. In conformance to this, the funeral was conducted at her late home on Jordan Prairie yesterday afternoon at 1:00. Rev. David Porterfield conducted the services and the pallbearers were Messrs. W.E. Pryce, D.E. Hook, Virgil Fleek, G.W., H.C., and E.E. Atherton. The remains were buried in the Dawson Cemetery. Those who knew Mrs. Fleek well knew her as an intelligent woman, always well informed and one with whom it was a pleasure to converse. Notwithstanding her being an invalid, she was bright and cheerful, always looked on the bright side of life. Mina C. Lewis was born in Exeter on Feb. 26, 1870 where her early life was spent. A telegram came from Chicago yesterday announcing the death of **Dr. G.A. Blakeley** in that city. He had gone to Chicago Monday night to be examined for heart trouble. We can get no particulars at this writing.

Albany Vindicator, Feb. 11, 1904

Dr. George A. Blakeley of this city died very suddenly in the Union Depot in Chicago on Wednesday, Feb. 3, aged 47. None but the doctor's family and a few intimate friends knew that he suffered from heart trouble but for some months he had been in a serious condition which was no doubt aggravated by his financial troubles and the loss of his son **Edwin** by drowning about two months ago. He went to Chicago on Monday night previous to his death to be examined by a specialist in relation to his heart trouble and overtaxed that organ in hurrying to the depot to take the train for home. He lived for about ten minutes after it was noticed that he was ill. The remains were taken to Evansville where the funeral was held Sunday afternoon at the M.E. Church, Rev. T.E. Foss officiating. The funeral was largely attended, a number from here being present. The service at the cemetery was conducted by the Masonic order. George Arthur Blakeley was born in Topeka, Kansas on May 8, 1857. He moved to Wisconsin with his parents when a year and a half to a farm about two miles south of Evansville where he grew to manhood. He married **Jennie Bargewell** on October 27, 1880. He graduated from Rush Medical College in Chicago on Feb. 17, 1885 and for several years practiced in Nebraska. He came to Albany in 1890 where he built up a good practice and was considered an excellent doctor. For four years he was postmaster here. Dr. Blakeley was a well read man in medicine, history and current events. He was never satisfied with a

superficial knowledge of any subject but always pursued his studies as far as possible. Dr. Blakeley leaves a wife and three sons and two daughters, a mother, sister and three brothers to mourn his untimely death.

Eight children were born to them, four sons and four daughters, all of whom are living. She was a good Christian woman, a firm Methodist; brought up her children to love God and follow his ways. She died Feb. 24, 1904 aged 83 years, 5 months and 12 days, following her husband who died Sept. 22, 1903. The funeral services were held at the Union Church Friday, conducted by Rev. D. Porterfield and the interment was in the adjoining cemetery.

An 11 month old child of **Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Gill** of Attica died Tuesday. Rev. T.E. Foss conducted the funeral services.

Mrs. F.L. Babler was the guest of her sister Mrs. Jessie Humes the first of this week.

Nicholas Cornelius, one of the oldest settlers in the county, died at his home in Monroe on Friday night. Deceased was born in 1815 and came to Green County in 1834. He leaves a wife and two children.

Mrs. T.G. Mitchell had an eight pound tumor removed from her breast in Janesville on Thursday. The operation was highly successful and she is doing as well as possible.

Albany Vindicator, March 17, 1904

Thomas Edmonds was born in Montgomeryshire, Wales on Nov. 3, 1841. He came to American in 1845 and died at his home in Albany on March 9. Deceased married **Mary E. Swancutt** on Dec. 21, 1874 who preceded him to the grave on Jan. 10, 1894. They were the parents of eight children all of whom are left to mourn their loss. He also leaves three sisters **Mesdames Aaron Jones of Evansville, William Garfield of Brooklyn and Philip Cadwalader** of Janesville, Iowa. Mr. Edmonds was well and favorably known in this community, and will be missed by many people besides his family. His last illness was exceedingly painful but loving hands did all

that could be done to smooth his pathway until death ended his suffering. The funeral was held at the Union Church on Friday, March 11 conducted by Elder E.P. Graves.

From the Topeka, Kansas Herald on March 8 we hear of the death of **Mrs. William Green** which occurred in that city on March 8. She was sick but a few days and but few of her friends knew of her illness. Her death was due to a congested condition of her system which caused weakness of the heart and finally death. Deceased was well known here where Mr. Green was in business in the early 80's and in Dayton where they lived previous to coming here. She was born in Steubenville, Ohio on November 19, 1846. Her maiden name was **Dalrymple**. She married William Green at Dayton, Ohio on November 4, 1868.

Albany Vindicator, March 24, 1904

The entire community was startled and shocked beyond measure Friday in learning of the death of Mrs. William E. Pryce which occurred at 10:00 in the morning. Although she had been sick for a week but few knew that she was critically ill but an attack of pneumonia was too much for her fragile body. Deceased was well known in the community where the greater part of her life was spent and few there are whose death would cause such universal grief. As a girl, wife and mother her lovable disposition and sterling womanly qualities entitled her to a large circle of friends. Ella V. Burns, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Burns, both deceased, was born in Clarno on Jan. 15, 1850 and died at her home south of Albany on March 18, 1904, aged 45 years, 2 months and 3 days. She married William Pryce on May 12, 1878. Four sons were born to them, one of whom passed away in infancy. The husband, three sons and three sisters upon whom this great bereavement has come have the deepest sympathy of all. Mrs. Pryce had long been a most consistent member of the M.E. Church and was a Christian in the full sense of the word. Funeral services were held at the home Sunday morning March 20, conducted by her pastor, Rev. T.E. Foss, who spoke feelingly of the deceased. The remains were laid to rest in the Albany cemetery.

Frank Frederick Schwerin was born in Sylvester on Jan. 18, 1860 and died at his home near Attica on March 17, 1904 after a week's illness with pneumonia, aged 44 years, 2 months and 29 days. The deceased was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Schwerin. He married Hannah Swartzlow on Oct. 19, 1882 and they went to house keeping on his father's farm in Juda. From there they moved to a farm near Attica which has been their home for 20 years. His wife and five children—three sons and two daughters are left to mourn the loss of a loving husband and a kind and indulgent father. The funeral was held in the M.E. Church in Attica on Sunday afternoon, March 20, Rev. T.E. Foss officiating. The interment was in the Attica Cemetery. A large assemblage gathered to pay the last tribute of respect to the deceased, a man who stood high in the community where he lived and indeed with all who knew him. Besides the family the deceased leaves two brothers and five sisters. Mr. Schwerin was an honored member of the Albany M.W.A. Camp and burial service of that order.

Ida Wittenwyler of Monticello and J.C. Schindler of Blanchardville were married in Milwaukee on March 27.

Mary L. Dodge was born June 25, 1826 and married Thomas Pashaw on April 2, 1846. She passed to the better land on April 2, aged 77 years, 9 months and 7 days. Mr. and Mrs. Pashaw have lived in the village of Albany 26 years. Quiet, inoffensive people, they have always enjoyed the respect of the community. They have buried five children, leaving two children living, Mrs. P.A. Neyhart and Mrs. Cal St. John, both of Avon. Mr. Pashaw, aged and infirm, is also left to mourn the loss of his aged companion of over half a century. The remains, in charge of H.G. Hein, were taken to Leeds Center, Columbia County, for burial in the family lot. As the family is

in dependent circumstances, generous hearted citizens contributed liberally towards the funeral and burial expenses.

Word was received Friday afternoon by the relatives of the death of **Ora Zentner**, **eldest son of Mary Zentner** of Progress, Wisconsin. He was taken sick in Milwaukee the first of December and the attending physician pronounced him afflicted with the disease of consumption. He at once requested to be taken home to his mother where he lingered three months. Ora was born in Green County, Wisconsin on March 10, 1879. Funeral services were held at the Gap Church by Rev. Porterfield of Albany on April 2. Ora will be deeply missed by his sorrowing mother and two younger brothers who but several years ago were called to part from the husband and father.

Albany Vindicator, April 14, 1904

Christian Jacobson, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of the Norwegian Settlement north of Albany, was instantly killed by the train leaving here at 7:40 Monday morning. Mr. Jacobson was coming to town on foot and was on the trestle west of the Big Sugar railroad bridge when the train caught him. He got down on the outer edge of the ties hoping to escape but after the engine passed, he raised his head when the tenders struck him and tore off the top of his head. The Monticello section crew had warned Mr. Jacobson that the train was due and they were still there when the accident happened. They assisted to carry the corpse to the home of his son Harry. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon. No blame is attached to the trainman as the place where the accident happened was near a curve and as the train was late it was making up lost time and could not be stopped in time. A coroner's jury held an inquest Tuesday and rendered a verdict that the deceased came to his death "by accident while trying to escape from the track of the St. Paul road west of the Sugar River bridge". Mr. Jacobson was in his 84th year and was lame, hard of hearing and otherwise infirm.

Christian Jacobson was called home on the morning of April 11 at the age of 83 years, 2 months and 2 days. He was one of the pioneers of Green County, having settled in 1850 on the farm where he resided until his death. From early life he was an earnest member of the Lutheran Church. Always kind and obliging, he won the respect and esteem of all. He leaves a wife and two daughters, Mrs. O. Tollefsrude of Orfordville and Mrs. S. M. Gilbertson of this city and one son, Harry, to mourn their loss. His pastor, Rev. Kvale, conducted the funeral services Wednesday afternoon April 13 and the remains were interred in the Lutheran cemetery near his home.

Attica: Lizzie Loughead of Belleville and Claude Dalrymple of Milwaukee were married on April 12 at the residence of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Loughead.

Albany Vindicator, April 28, 1904

Thomas Lewis, whose illness we mentioned some time ago, passed away on Sunday night with cancer of the stomach, aged 74 years, 7 months and 5 days. Mr. Lewis was born in Radnorshire, Wales on Oct. 19, 1829. He

came to American about 1854 and lived for a time at Waukesha and then came to Green County where he has since resided on a farm five miles northeast of Albany and later here in this village. He was married in 1855 to **Mrs. Margaret (Jones) Swancutt** who preceded him to the other world last October. Deceased was a sturdy old countryman, industrious and frugal and held the respect of the entire community. The funeral was held at the Union Church Tuesday afternoon being conducted by Elder E.P. Graves and the remains interred in the adjoining cemetery.

The funeral of **Mrs. Fred Partridge** was held from the M.E. Church here Monday afternoon, services being conducted by Rev. T.E. Ross, the pastor. Mrs. Partridge died at the county farm in Rock County, where she had been for some time. The remains were accompanied here by Mr. Partridge and Mrs. Fred Carle of Janesville. Mrs. Partridge's maiden name was **Lucinda Rogers**, and she was born in Harwich, Cape Cod, Massachusetts, on June 16, 1827. She came to Janesville in 1855 and married Fred Partridge on May 27, 1857. The husband and one child, **Mrs. E.N. Dorr**, survive her. Three children have passed away, one son in infancy and two daughters grown to womanhood. Deceased lived in Albany for a number of years and was highly respected. Though a life long mute, she was cordial to all and possessed a goodly number of friends. For about 12 years she was a member of the Albany M.E. Church.

Mrs. Leah Isodore Bucklin Ludington died at the home of her daughter Mrs. B.L. Kelly near Evansville on April 20, aged 60. Death followed three weeks illness following a stroke of paralysis. Mrs. Ludington was born in Little Falls, New York but came to this state at the age of seven years. For many years the Ludington family lived on their homestead four miles north of Albany but for the past six years the husband and wife have lived apart. We understand that Mr. Ludington is now seriously ill in Evansville. Five children are living all of whom were present at their mother's funeral which was held from the Kelly home Saturday afternoon. The interment was at Evansville.

Peter Bell died at his home in this village about 4:00 Tuesday afternoon after an illness dating from last Thursday from double pneumonia. The funeral was held from the M.E. Church this afternoon at 2:00.

Mrs. George Atkinson died Sunday at the home of her daughter Mrs. George Sanders. The funeral was Tuesday from the house and interment in the English Settlement Cemetery.

A.O. Wilson, mayor of Janesville, died Thursday. He edited the Janesville Recorder for 20 years and has been postmaster and member of the legislature. He was 62 years old.

The pleasant home of **Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Peebles** was the scene of a very enjoyable social gathering on Sunday, May 1 when about a dozen neighbors and friends were invited to participate in the celebration of the host's 75th birthday. Mr. and Mrs. Peebles are among the oldest and most highly respected citizens of the community.

Albany Vindicator, May 12, 1904

Mary Swancutt was born in Radnorshire, Wales on Dec. 15, 1833. She came to this country with her parents when she was 12 years old and settled in Albany. She married George Atkinson on Feb. 11, 1854. To this union were born ten children, five of whom have preceded her, with their father, to the other shore. George Atkinson died 18 years ago. Since the death of her husband she has made her home with her children. At the age of 18, she was converted and united with the P.M. Church and remained a dutiful member until 36 years ago. She then united with the M.E. Church at Brodhead and has been since then a consistent member. As a result of her early acquaintance with God, she has been able to give her best life to her church. She was a kind and loving mother. Her children were the joy of her life. Nothing was too good for her family, consequently they will mourn the loss of one of the best mothers who has had the joy of seeing five of her family settled in life, the others having died in childhood. The living children all were present at her death. She leaves besides these to mourn a brother and five grandchildren. The death of Sister Atkinson is not a surprise to us because she has been an invalid for many years; consequently she has been ripening for the grave and on Sunday, May 1, she passed to her reward. The funeral was held on Tuesday, May 3 from the home of her daughter Mrs. George Santer in Albany where her death occurred after a week's illness. Rev. T.E. Foss conducted the services and the remains were interred in the English Settlement Cemetery.

Peter Bell was born Nov. 12, 1821 in Clinton County, New York. He came to Wisconsin in 1851 and has lived in this state ever since except while he was in the army during the Civil War. He died at the home of his daughter Mrs. Francis Atkinson on May 3 after a brief illness of pneumonia. He married Huldah Miller in 1840. To this union were born four children, two sons and two daughters. One son died in infancy. The three remaining children with their mother were present at the death. He leaves besides those already mentioned three grandchildren, one brother, on sister and a host of friends. Brother Bell had been a member of the M.E.Church since 1852 and was one of the oldest members of the Albany M.E. Church. During the period of his church life, he had served several years as a trustee, class leader and steward resigning only to give place to younger people. Brother Bell's life has been an open book. We have all known him to be a man of religious integrity. We shall miss him in the church, in public worship, in class room and in the community. His place will appear vacant to us but he has surely gone to take his place in heaven. Mr. Bell enlisted in the Civil War on Aug. 14, 1862 in Company K, 33rd Wisconsin V.I. and served three years participating in 42 battles. Sixteen of the battles were heavy engagements in one of which he lost the sight in his right eye, a mark of the dreadful war that he carried to his grave. He was at the siege of Vicksburg from the beginning and finally shared in the victory. He was a soldier of two armies representing the Army of the U.S.A. and the greater army of the living God. He was a member of Erastus Hoyt Post 69 G.A.R. the comrades of which were present at his funeral acting as bearers and escort.

Elvin Luke Edwards and Etta May Atkinson, both of Albany were married at the M.E. parsonage on Tuesday afternoon May 10 in the presence of a few of their nearest relatives.

Louis Mitchell and Nellie Craoke were married in Rockford yesterday.

Richard Ainley died Saturday in Janesville at the age of 74. Mrs. Ainley died about two months ago. They lived in Albany for several years.

Albany Vindicator, May 19, 1904

V.B.S. Newman of Juda had a stroke of paralysis about 6:30 Tuesday morning from the effects of which he died

about 2:00 that afternoon. He was unconscious from the very first. Mr. Newman was well known here where he conducted a mercantile business for several years. He was known as a good man, a friend to all who knew him and his sudden death is a great shock not only to his immediate family but to the several communities in which from time to time he made his home. Mr. Newman was born in German, Fayette County, Pennsylvania on June 13, 1832 and came to Wisconsin in 1840. When a young man he taught school. He enlisted in the Civil War in 1862 and served until honorably discharged in 1865. He was in Sherman's march to the sea and otherwise participated in many important engagements. From a private he was promoted to second and then first lieutenant. In the spring of 1863 his regiment was captured and he spent eight months in Libby prison. After the war he again taught school for a time and then went into the mercantile business in Juda, afterwards coming to Albany in the same line. After living there he lived in Brodhead for a time and then held a position as Capitol employee in Madison afterwards engaging in business for himself for several years. Home ties were strong, however, and he moved back to a small farm near Juda where he was enjoying a comfortable home and ideal old age. Mr. Newman married on Sept. 20, 1860 Rebecca J. Patton. His good and faithful helpmate for many years, with three sons and two daughters are left to mourn. One daughter, Mrs. F.V. Atherton, resides here. Mrs. Charles Edwards, also of this city, is a cousin. A number from here besides the relatives attended the funeral held at the home at 10:00 and at the church at 11:00 today.

The entire community was shocked Thursday morning upon hearing that **Mrs. George Ostrander** had left home in a fit of dementia and her whereabouts were unknown. Tracks leading to the river were discovered and the stream was dragged for hours in proximity to where it was supposed she may have drowned. The theory of drowning was finally abandoned and Friday morning a party of 150 men and women commenced searching the heavy timber west of town. Her remains were found about 10:00 in Hudson's woods near Keefe's, **Richard Reese** being the first to discover her. She lay very peacefully but evidence of a struggle was found about sixty feet distant where she had taken off her shoes and part of her clothing. An inquest and post mortem examination disclosed the fact that she had taken a large quantity of arsenic and had probably been dead 24 hours. Deceased resided with her husband and six children on **William Smiley's** farm. Her mind had been affected at times and she had threatened to take her life.
