Joseph Bruner, 22, formerly employed as a cheese maker near Monroe, was run down and killed by a train in the Illinois Central yards at Freeport.

Henry Gottstein of Monroe, 4, was burned to death by an explosion of kerosene which his father had thrown on the fire. The father was seriously burned and the house practically destroyed yesterday morning. Mrs. Gottstein and four children and another family living in the house escaped injury.

John P. Caradine died at his home northwest of Albany on Monday evening, Feb. 14 at the age of 71 years, 8 months and 13 days. He was born in Wales on June 1, 1839(?), coming to America in 1841 and has since resided in Albany Township. He married in 1870 **Miss Harriett Eggleson** who survives him together with one son and one daughter. Two brothers and two sisters also mourn their loss. Mr. Caradine has been a great sufferer with rheumatism, and has been unable to walk except with a cane or crutches but through it all he presented a cheerful disposition. Those who knew him esteemed him for his integrity and deeply regret his demise. The funeral was held at the Union Church in the English Settlement, Rev. C.D. Mayhew officiating and the remains interred in the adjoining cemetery.

Albany Vindicator, Feb. 24, 1910

Word was received last week of the death of **Mrs. J.F. Lacy** at Algona, Iowa. The news will be learned with regret by those who knew the family. Mr. and Mrs. Lacy and family lived in and near Albany for many years and had a host of warm friends here. The family moved from Albany to West Bend, Iowa in 18?? And in 1887 to Algona. Mrs. Lacy was born in Wales in 1835 and came to this country at the age of four years. She married **John F. Lacy** in 1855 who, with two children survive her. She joined the Baptist Church in 1873. She had been in failing health for two years, a trip to California failing to restore her health.

Cyrus S. Gleason of Medicine Lodge, Kansas who spent several weeks here during the last sickness of his brother-in-law, the late E.F. Warren, died on the 10th inst., of pneumonia, aged 78 years. Mr. Gleason was one of the pioneers of Albany and was engaged in the milling business here in early days. He was a veteran of the Civil War, serving the entire four years. His funeral was held under the auspices of the Masonic Order of which he was an honored member.

Nelson B. Francis, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Francis of Janesville was in a critical condition with spinal meningitis complicated with an attack of pneumonia. He was taken to the Augustana Hospital in Chicago on Tuesday.

Albany Vindicator, March 3, 1910

Mrs. Mary Zentner died on Feb. 21, 1910 at a hospital in Milwaukee after an operation for an abdominal tumor about three weeks previous. Funeral services were held from the Baptist Church on Feb. 24 conducted by the pastor Rev. C.D. Mayhew and were largely attended by friends and relatives. The remains were interred beside those of her husband and children in the Gap Cemetery. Mary Jane Stephenson was born in Sylvester, Green County on July 26, 1854. She was the daughter of Nathaniel and Nancy Ann Stephenson. She lived with her parents on the farm during her early life, attending the district school and later attended school in Albany where she fitted herself for teaching. She followed her chosen profession in the public school in Green County for 16 years with great success. On June 3, 1878 she married Isaiah Zentner. The remained for a short time in Sylvester and then moved to Clay County, Kansas, returning thence to Green County and living in Monroe and Decatur Townships. The family then moved to Wood County, Wisconsin where the husband and father passed away on Sept. 22, 1901. In 1906 she moved to Albany, accompanied by her sons **Harry and Victor**, continuing her resident here until her decease on Feb. 21, 1910. She was the mother of four boys, **Ora and Freddie**, who preceded her and Harry and Victor who were with her at the time of her departure. Besides her two sons she is survived by one sister Mrs. Emma Edwards of Marshall, Minnesota and one brother, **Byron** of Albany. When she was 17 years of age, she united with the Monticello Prairie Baptist Church, being baptized in the Sugar River at Albany. She afterwards took her membership to the Disciples Church at Monroe. She lived a consistent Christian life, always being active as a worker in the church as her circumstances would permit, never missing a service if she could possibly attend. She was a woman of unusually keen intellectual powers and fond of literature. As a personal friend, she permitted none to excel her in loyalty, always fearlessly defending and aggressively opposing adverse comment upon those who were fortunate enough to win her regard.

She is survived by eight children, George of Brooklyn; Edmund of Dayton; Mary Th – n – ey (partially illegible) of McHenry, N.D.; Sarah H.

Beswick of Bolton, Lancashire, England; Nathan of Dayton; Mrs. Ellen D. Broughton and Joseph of Albany; Jeanette Richards of River Falls, who with many friends, remain to mourn their loss. Mrs. Farnsworth was a devoted wife and loving mother who centered her life on her home. She was confirmed in the Church of England at an early

age and remained a believer in this faith all her life. Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Broughton on Friday morning conducted by rev. C.D. Mayhew and the remains taken to Dayton for interment.

He was united in marriage with Marancy Fenton on July 3, 1858. To this union were born two children, Mabel and Cornelius. His wife passed away on may 2, 1909. Besides the son and daughter he leaves two brothers, William and Calvin and two sisters Mrs. Sophia Reed and Mrs. Harriett Kelly. Mrs. Reed and the brother William were with him when he died but the others were too distant to come in time. The subject of this sketch united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at an early age and has lived an honest, upright life. His cheerful disposition endeared him to all his friends and he will be greatly missed by everyone in his own family.
