January 4, 1892

James Shaffer of Waterloo, Iowa arrived in this city yesterday from Janesville where he had been attending the funeral of his mother. He left this morning for his home in Waterloo.

January 6, 1892

It is seldom we are called upon to record the death of a gentleman who has lived to the age of **Elisha Mosher**, who departed this life this morning at 3:40, aged 91 years, 22 days. He was born in Washington Co., N.Y. on Dec. 15, 1800, where he married **Elizabeth Allen** to whom nine children were born. The family removed to Green County in 1843 and years ago he was one of the most enterprising citizens of Monroe where he was in business for many years. He had made many friends. He held many honorable positions in this county and discharged their duties honorably and well. The deceased lost his first wife in 1868 and in 1869 he married **Mrs. Eleeta Carrington** who survives him. He was a kind hearted man and performed many deeds of charity. The deceased leaves a wife and two children who will mourn the death of a devoted husband and kind parent. Seven children preceded him to the grave. The funeral will be conducted by the Odd Fellows to which association the deceased was a respected member. The ceremony will take place at the late residence of the deceased on east Washington Street at 2:00 Friday afternoon.

January 12, 1892

Thomas Emerson, a most worthy and well respected citizen of Monroe, died at his home on Thursday morning, Jan. 14 at 2:00 in his 74th year, after a lingering illness. He was born August 13, 1818 in the town of Lurgan, Northern Ireland and came to American when quite young. He came to Wisconsin in 1844 and passed his last days in this city where a devoted daughter took care of him. He had been reared in the Episcopal faith and died a Christian. About a year ago Mrs. Emerson died and left the husband in the care of his daughter. Two sons are in the ranch business in Colorado and may return in time for the funeral. The deceased was a gentleman who made many warm friends. In politics he was a Democrat.

All of his family were present at his death with the exception of his only son **Edgar** of West Virginia to whom a telegram was sent Saturday. No answer had been received as of Monday night and the time of the funeral will depend on his arrival. Mr. Moore was a brother-in-law of **Hon. P. J. Clawson** of Monroe and **R. B. Clawson** of Brodhead.

January 22, 1892

Otis, a son of **Levi Knudsen** at Spring Grove, died January 21 and the funeral will take place from his late residence at 10:00 Monday morning.

January 28, 1892

January 26, 1892

Mrs. G. Leuemberger received the following dispatch this morning: McMinnville, Oregon, Jan. 25—**C.**

Leuemberger is dead. What shall we do with the body? This is all the particulars the family received in regard to his death. He was an old citizen of Monroe having lived here for the past 30 years. The news is a severe blow to his family who were not aware of his sickness. The body, no doubt, will be brought to this city for burial.

January 27, 1892

Any person who have read the history of the Battle of Atlanta on the 21st and 22nd July, 1864, must know that General Leggett's division of the 17th Army Corps was in a tight place when General Hardee came in their rear. But the citizens of Green County will always read the story of that battle with pride as they realize the position of Company K, 10th Wisconsin Infantry on that dreadful day. Company K was at the extreme left of General Forest's brigade and was charged upon some six or seven times. General Hardee's men were enthused by their success in

driving General Smith's division and captured a battery and placed a flag on the parapet not more than 150 feet from where I stood. Charged upon us time and again but they could not get in. The Green County boys held the hill. We charged and took the day. We were ordered to hold the ground at all hazards and we did. We knew that General McPherson was killed. There was only a small part of our company there but they were brave and true and everyone felt that the success of the day and the liberties of their nation rested on their shoulders. Yes, it was the brave Green County boys with **Capt. James Norris** at their head with the 16th Wisconsin Infantry that took the pride out of General Hood on the 22nd July, 1864.

P. C. Bennett, who has filled the position of postmaster in this city for the past four years turned the office over to **Robert A. Etter** the newly appointed postmaster this morning. Mr. Bennett is perfectly satisfied to step down to the life of a private citizen.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Young left this morning for Chattanooga, Tenn., to spend some time to see if the climate will have the desired effect on his health.

February 3, 1892

Gottlieb Leunenberger and son Otto left this city a few months ago for Oregon where they went to live. It was but a short time until the news reached his family that he had died. A telegram was sent from here by his family to embalm the body and forward it to this city in charge of the little son who was with his father. This morning the remains of the deceased arrived here in charge of the son. The funeral will take place from his late residence in this city at 1:30 in the afternoon. The ceremony will be in charge of the Concordia Lodge I.O.O.F.

February 5, 1892

The remains of **Mrs. Caldron** arrive in this city this morning from Iowa where she died. Her remains will be buried in the Austin Cemetery.

February 8, 1892

Frank Maharra of Charles City, Iowa and **Della Harrison** of this city were married this afternoon at the residence of the bride's parents. The happy couple left this afternoon for Milwaukee where they met the show that Mr. Maharra belongs to.

February 9, 1892

Dora A., wife of **Orvil Tracy**, died at Brodhead on Wednesday morning, Feb 3, in the (*illegible number*) year of her age. Soon after their marriage they moved to their farm near Oakley, Wisconsin, where they resided until a short time previous to her death. They moved to Brodhead on Dec. 10, 1891. She leaves to mourn her death a devoted husband, and sweet little boy, **Harry A.**, aged 5, five sisters and two brothers. The funeral services were held Friday at 1:00 in the Union Church. Rev. Harris of Rock Grove officiated assisted by Rev. Woodruff of Brodhead and was buried in the same cemetery.

February 11, 1892

Juda: **Dow Patton** died Monday morning at 8:00. Dow's youth, his recent marriage, and extreme suffering all combined to make the event one of unusual sadness in the community where he has always lived and was so well known.

Juda: **Mrs. Richards** was summoned to Evansville last week by a telegram announcing the very serious illness of her daughter. Although she left by the first train her daughter had been dead three hours when she arrived.

February 13, 1892

Fred Singer of Monroe and **Minnie Eichen**(?) of Milwaukee were married at the residence of the bride's parents at 340 14th St., Milwaukee, at 6:00 Friday evening, Feb. 11.

February 17, 1892

Died, at the house of **Mrs. Lydia Patton**, on Monday morning, Feb. 8, **Dow D. Patton**, aged 22 years, 6 months and 15 days. Dow was the youngest child but one of the late **Rev. G. R. Patton** and was born near Juda on July 23, 1869 and died Feb. 8, 1892. He was a sufferer from early childhood from the disease which resulted in his death. He was married to **Ida Richards** on Aug. 30, 1891. They began to keep house in Juda one month previous to the beginning of Mr. Patton's last sickness when they went to his mother's and remained until his death which occurred five weeks from the time he took sick. Although his death was looked for yet when the news came "Dow is dead", public sympathy was as if the death was wholly unexpected. He was a member of the Baptist Church up to the time of his

marriage. His six month's bride, his widowed mother, his sisters and brothers are left to mourn their loss. The funeral service was held last Wednesday, Feb. 10 in the Baptist Church conducted by Rev. J. Anderick, assisted by Rev. H. Brennaman.

February 20, 1892

Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Sanborn of this city mourn the death of their six month old baby. It died yesterday afternoon of membranous croup after a week's sickness.

February 23, 1892

February 24, 1892

The funeral of **Mr. O'Connell**, one of the oldest citizens of this section of the country took place yesterday forenoon from the St. Victor's Catholic Church in this city and was largely attended.

February 26, 1892

T. Z. Buck, an old resident of Monticello, is lying at the point of death at the residence of **Senator Bacon** in that village. Mr. Buck is well known in this city and is an old soldier. He returned only a few days since from a several month's sojourn in the South and during his absence was taken with the grippe, which sickness afterwards brought on pleurisy. He is quite well along in years.

Charles Reed, who has been a long sufferer from consumption, died at the residence of his parents in Monroe on Thursday, Feb. 26, aged about 30. He leaves a wife, parents, and other relatives to mourn his loss. His funeral will take place from the residence of his parents next Monday at 2:00.

Thomas Jones, who was summoned to this city to attend the funeral of his step-mother last week, returned to his home in Ft. Scott, Kansas this morning.

February 27, 1892

Peter Schindler, who has been ailing for the past few weeks, but who was not confined to his bed, died this afternoon about 12:30. He was taken violently ill about 3:00 this morning which terminated in his death. He was a nice young man of the city who had many friends.

Mrs. Charles Rood arrived home last night from Florida where she had been to visit her parents.

J. L. Rood arrived home from Nebraska on the 10:37 train to attend the funeral of his son **Charley** which takes place tomorrow.

February 29, 1892

Mrs. Emma Ball died at her residence in this city at 9:20 last evening, of lung trouble, aged 35. The funeral will take place Wednesday at 10:00 at the house and 10:30 from the Methodist Episcopal Church.

March 2, 1892

Mrs. D. A. Adams of Beloit died early yesterday morning after a brief illness. Her husband died suddenly in Chicago last summer. Both were believers in the Christian Science cure.

March 4, 1892

Brodhead: **Mrs. Christopher Kelly** died at her home in this city on Tuesday morning. The remains will be taken to Beloit tomorrow (Friday) for interment.

Brodhead: **James Whitehead** died at his home in the town of Plymouth a few miles south of Orfordville last Sunday, of pneumonia. The funeral will be held at the M.E. Church in Orfordville tomorrow (Friday) at noon.

Married, at the Episcopal parsonage, in Juda, on Feb. 23, by Rev. C. J. Kunst, **Henry F. W. Dinse** of Avon, Rock Co., to **Emilie E. A. Nass** of the town of Jefferson, Green County, Wisconsin.

Mrs. Barbara Duerst of New Glarus died last night of stomach trouble at the age of 80.

March 7, 1892

Died, at her home five miles east of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., of quick consumption, **Mary Ann**, wife of **John C. Smith**, aged 61. **Mary Ann Bloom** was born in Center Co., Pa., on Dec. 12, 1830 and was the second of a family of 12 children, six of whom survive. She was married to John C. Smith on Aug. 5, 1848, over forty years ago. By this union there were eight children, four boys and four girls. The second child died in childhood. The rest are all living, the youngest 18. Mrs. Smith was a member of the M.E. Church. In 1850 they moved to Green County, Wisconsin where they lived until three years ago when Mr. Smith came to Lawrence County to establish a home and was followed by Mrs. Smith two years ago. Twenty years ago she lost an eye from neuralgia, the ball of the eye bursting from the pain and eight years ago she lost the other the same way, leaving her totally blind in her old age. She bore all this with a Christ like spirit. All of her children but one, **Mrs. Susan E. Stuckle** of La Porte, Indiana, were with her during her last days. She remained conscious to the end and at 6:00 am Sunday last she passed quietly away. Her remains were buried in Hughs Cemetery Monday. Mr. Smith received an injury last fall which confined him to the home over four months and was unable to be present at the funeral.

April 20, 1892

She was brought back last Friday night on a sled by her loving husband who remained with her until her death. She was a fine, healthy woman up to the time when she was taken sick. She leaves besides brothers and sisters to mourn her loss a young husband, and two small children, aged three and one year. June 1, 1892

The Janesville Recorder contains the following remarks relative to the death of **Ellis Shobbell** who died Monday, May 30: Ellis Shobbell was born in Lycoming Co., Pa., on March 20, 1835 and was the son of **Peter and Catherine (Hill) Shobbell**, all natives of Pennsylvania. He received a common school education and when 19 years of age began to learn the carpenter's trade at which he worked until August of 1862 when he entered the 12th Wisconsin Battery and served until the close of the war. He took part in the Battles of Iuka, Corinty, Raymond, and was 49 days in front of Vicksburg during that famous siege. From there he went to Missouri Ridge and Allatoona and on the memorable march to the sea and after that the siege of Savannah and finally to the last battle of the rebellion in Bentonville, N.C. He was an exemplary soldier, a true friend and patriotic citizen. In May of 1867, he married **Miss Mattie Parker**, daughter of **John Parker**. She was born in Oneida(?) County, New York. Four children have blessed their union all daughters: **Kittie, Mamie, Mattie** and **Edna**.

Aaron C. McCalla(?) and **Mrs. Sylvia Gray Lindley** were married on Sunday, May 29 at the residence of the bride by S. W. Abbott, Esq., all of this city. The wedding of this venerable couple was a very quiet affair only a few witnesses invited to be present.

July 5, 1892

The remains of **Captain L. T. Carr** arrived in this city Sunday morning by special train accompanied by a number of relatives and friends who came from Madison to pay their last respects. The funeral train was met at the depot by a large number of Odd Fellows and Grand Army men of which orders he was a member, who escorted the remains and the friends to the cemetery. We copy the following from the Madison Democrat :

Captain Carr was born in Henriette, Monroe County, N.Y., on July 5, 1831. He came to Wisconsin in 1860 and located at Shullsburg. He removed to Monroe in 1862 and from there to Jefferson, Wisconsin in 1878. He was long editor and proprietor of the Jefferson Banner. Later he went to Neillsville and was for some time publisher of the Neillsville Times. He came to this city from there to an appointment to a position in the capitol. He was chief clerk of the assembly during the Democratic reign of 1883. His mental abilities fitted him for clerical positions but he was physically unable to do any such work and was given the position he held at his own request. He was a veteran of the war, enlisting in Company G, 22nd Wisconsin on August 6, 1862. He was made first lieutenant in Company K, 16th Wisconsin in December of 1863 and resigned nearly a year later; was commissioned Captain of Company A, 46th Wisconsin on Jan. 5, 1865 and mustered out October 10, 1865. He leaves a widow and stepdaughter, **Maude**, aged about 14. There are other children by his first wife, living in various parts of the country.

Capt. I. T. Carr who was buried here Sunday last was at one time associated with the Monroe Sentinel and afterwards editor of the Green County Reformer. He has two wives, a son and a daughter buried in Greenwood Cemetery and his remains now lay by the side of those who went before him.

J. K. Eilert, the druggist and one of the best citizens in Green County, we are sorry to say, is in a very feeble condition and it is feared he can never be restored to health. He was one of the early settlers of Monroe and was one of the enterprising men of this city who did much for its growth and prosperity.

October 2, 1892

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Becker mourn the loss of one of their twins, a little boy, who died last night of dyspepsia of the stomach aged about 7 months. The funeral will take place from the house tomorrow afternoon at 2:00.

October 1, 1892

Married, at the residence of the bride, in this city, on Sept. 25, by Rev. W. Woodruff, **Rev. T. J. Lewis** of Avoca, Wisconsin to **Mrs. Fanny Haskins** of Brodhead.

The same paper states that "Mrs. Lewis scratched her finger on the screen door last Sunday. It has resulted in blood poisoning and is considered a dangerous case."

October 5, 1892

Juda: **Samuel Vance** received a telegram last Wednesday announcing the death of his sister **Mrs. R. B. Allensworth** who together with her husband was burned to death the 26th ult., in Howard, S.D.

October 12, 1892

Robert Allenworth was born near Columbus, Ohio on Aug. 28, 1823. He lived there until ten years of age when, losing his father, he was taken to Uniontown, Pa., and was adopted by his uncle who carefully raised and educated him. **Miss Rosena Vance** was born near Uniontown, Pa., on May 30, 1825. The subjects of this sketch were married

at Uniontown in 1842. Nine children were born to this happy union but only three are now living, viz.: **Henry James** of Independence, Iowa; **Mrs. Margaret Debolt** of Howard, S.D.; and **Theodore B.** of Madison, S.D. In 1849 they moved to Lancaster, Wisconsin. Shortly afterwards Mr. Allenworth, in company with **General Collins, Theodore Barber**, left Lancaster for California. They went overland by ox team. The journey took six months. Remaining one year, they returned and settled in Beetown, Wisconsin and engaged in lead mining. After two years they moved to Monroe. In 1861 he again went overland to California. Upon returning he entered upon the milling business. In 1875 the family moved to Independence, Iowa. Again, though much past mid life, he sought the gold fields of Montana and Idaho. Shortly afterwards he returned and his family moved to Howard, S.D., where with the exception of a brief visit to mining regions, he has made his home. He was acquainted with General Fremont, Kit Carson and Bridger and others. It was he who at the head of a company of men first rode through Bridger Canyon. He did much police duty in his home in the east and at the time of his death was city marshal of Howard. They both died in the great conflagration in Howard on Monday, Sept. 26. They are buried in Graceland Cemetery.
