January 22, 1889

Richard Keegan of Washington is reported so ill on Friday last that his recovery is doubtful.

The funeral of **Jonas Shook** took place from the Christian Chapel on the 18th inst. Rev. D.R. Howe performed the sad rites. He settled in Adams Township fifty years ago.

Charles City, Iowa, January 15

Joseph Kelly died here today of old age being over 80. He was the first settler and (*illegible word*) the land where Charles City now stands in 1853. His wife died last September.

We clip the above telegram from the Chicago Tribune of Jan. 17. Mr. Kelly was an old citizen of this county and a brother of **Mordecai Kelly** of this village. Joseph Kelly settled in Green County in 1836 on what is now known as the Clark farm and was the first hotel keeper in Monroe.

January 23, 1889

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Allman will leave tomorrow for "Deadwood" in the "Black Hills" on the train where they will make their permanent home.

February 2, 1889

Mrs. Polly Potts of Orangeville is dangerously sick and her sister **Mrs. E. Buck** has arrived from Juda to remain for a time.

The Darlington Journal of Jan. 30 contains the following: "Died, at Philadelphia, Pa., at the residence of her son **Lyman Orton**, Esq., **Mrs. Nancy C. Orton**, aged 85. The remains were brought to Darlington and interred in the cemetery on the 26th, the funeral services being held at the residence of the Honorable **P. A. Orton**. The deceased lady was a resident of our city for many years and was loved and revered by all who knew her.

Mr. George L.(?) Brown of the Dubuque Times and **Alice J. Sanborn** were married by Rev. H. D. Jenkins of the 1st Presbyterian Church of Freeport at the residence of the bride's parents on Wednesday, Jan. 30.

Mrs. Stephen Miller of this city received a telegram announcing the death of her aunt **Mrs. Joseph Bowers** of Whitewater.

February 4, 1889

Died, at the residence of her father in this village, on Monday, Feb. 4, **Miss Ella E. Voght** of neuralgia of the brain, aged (*illegible it could be 37*). She was a hard worker and a fruitful daughter. On the death of her mother some years ago, she stepped into her mother's shoes doing the regular routine of housework as well as looking after the younger

children of the family. With a strict attention to business, she succeeded in bringing up the family as well as any mother could. She has remained at home to look after the interests of her father while the rest of the family have gotten married or gone off to seek other employment. Last summer her sister **Carrie** died leaving a small child and Ella took it upon herself to care for the little one. She had suffered for many years with scrofula which had broken down her constitution and being of a nervous temperament the grief of her sister's death and the violent attacks of neuralgia proved too much for her frail body to endure and was no doubt the cause of her death.

William M. Bowers, an old resident of this city, died Sunday afternoon, Feb. 3, of pneumonia, aged 69. He will be remembered by a large number of citizens on account of the Bowers yeast he used to make. He was sick only a few days when death overcame him.

February 27, 1889

Oakley

Aggie Kisor departed this life on Feb. 22, 1889 at the residence of **Solomon Mattison**. She was a patient sufferer and was loved by all on account of her infirmity. Her funeral was held at the Union Church on Sunday, the Rev. Shuler of Rock Grove preached the sermon, after which a large concourse of friends followed her remains to the last resting place in the old Basswood Church Burying Ground.

Mrs. Harvey Barmore was called to Brodhead Monday morning by a telegram announcing the death of her mother who had suddenly died early that morning.

March 6, 1889

Married, on Tuesday evening, March 5, **John Friday** and **Julia Sullivan**, by Rev. Mr. Koch at the German Lutheran church. Mr. and Mrs. Friday left this morning via the Illinois Central. They go to Ponca, Nebraska where he is engaged in the hardware business.

March 15, 1889

The Brodhead Independent of March 13 contains the following obituary of Mrs. Randall who died recently in that city. "**Mrs. Eunice Randall** died at the home of her granddaughter **Mrs. H. B. Ten Eyck** in Brodhead on March 9, in the 89th year of her age. The maiden name of Grandma Randall was **Eunice Cheney**, daughter of **Daniel and Irene Cheney**. She was born in Essex, Vermont near Lake Champlain July 26, 1800. When she was eight years old, her parents moved to Cattaraugus County, New York. Of her eight children, four died when young. In 1830(?) the husband died leaving the four remaining children to care for; a work which was well done. In 1851 she came with her children to Wisconsin and located on a farm in Avon, Rock County. Here she remained until 1873 when she removed to Brodhead. Most of the time since she made her home with her son **Captain A. N. Randall**. One year ago last Thanksgiving she went to live with her granddaughter Mrs. Ten Eyck and remained there until her death. The deceased very early in life professed religion and with her husband united with the Methodist Church. About two years before her death she was stricken with paralysis which largely deprived her of the power of speech. She was much beloved by her family, friends and neighbors."

On Monday, **Captain A. N. Randall** of this village received a telegram announcing the death of his brother **Elisha J. Randall** at his home in Quincy, Illinois. Further information is that his wife found him dead in his bedroom at 7:00 Monday morning. The cause of death was apoplexy. He was 67 years of age and had been a resident of Quincy for many years. He leaves a wife and four children.

May 2, 1889

Michael Adams, son of **George Adams** of this city, after an absence of 39 years, in the far west, returned yesterday to the astonishment of this parents and relatives. His recent location was in Washington Territory.

May 8, 1889

William Gavigan, who a few weeks ago fell from a fence, struck his head, and was supposed to have been fatally injured, it is now reported that he committed suicide. He left **Mr. Crotty's** residence in Adams Township yesterday at 1:00 armed with a revolver. Eight cartridges, his hat and coat were found yesterday, pants and socks were found this morning but at the time of this writing, nothing further. He left a letter with **Sarah Crotty** saying she should keep it until his return. He also stated that when she would hear the report of a revolver he would be no more. Since the above was reported Gavigan was found near Mr. Crotty's under some hay. When he was first discovered he shot at those hunting him and then shot himself in the left side. He was not dead at the time, but it is supposed death must soon follow.

May 15, 1889

A few weeks ago **Louis Ostrander** of Jefferson left home to attend school in Dixon in apparent good health. Last week word came that he was laying at the point of death. His mother left for his bedside on Saturday.

May 29, 1889

Twin Grove:

Death has claimed one of our dearest friends, **Lillian Walker**, who in former days was one of our Sunday School workers and loved by all who knew her. She had been a patient sufferer for a year but was never known to complain

and although her disease was a throat and lung problem she never lost her sweet voice and a few days before she died she sang her favorite hymn "What a Friend We Have In Jesus". She died in Chicago on Wednesday evening and the family came home with the remains on Friday. The funeral took place Saturday morning, with Rev. Beidler officiating.

Juda, May 21:

Mrs. E. J. Blackford started for Dakota last Wednesday being called there by a telegram announcing the serious illness of her daughter **Mrs. B. B. Rewell**. A message came soon after she started telling of her death.....The news has just been received of the death of **E. T. Fleek** of Decatur. He has been sick since last Thursday.

June 1, 1889

The funeral of **Mrs. Ephraim Bowen** of Brodhead took place last Wednesday. The attendance was very large. There were a number present from this city to show their respect for the deceased. Mr. Bowen had a magnificent monument erected, 27 feet high on his lot in the cemetery a year ago. The remains of Mrs. Bowen were enclosed in a beautiful casket. A large number of superb roses were bestowed by her friends. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Prescott whose elegy to the deceased was richly deserved. Those who knew her best say she was an intelligent lady whose kindly nature and affable manners made her home attractive to all of kindred tastes and the seat of generous hospitality. From her grave will spring tender recollections of her many virtues.

June 3, 1889

Mr. Joderick Kubly of Jordan Center left for Switzerland this morning for a visit to his aged father and brothers. May he have a safe journey.

June 27, 1889

Died, at the residence of **Erastus Hulbert** on Saturday, June 22, **Miss Kate Hall**, in the 17th year of her age. Sister Hall was a consistent Christian and a member of the Juda Baptist Church. She was by occupation a teacher for which she had carefully prepared herself and in which work she was engaged when attacked by her last illness. The funeral sermon was preached in the Juda Baptist Church by her pastor Rev. J. Andereck from 2nd Corinthians, 5th Chapter, 1st Verse. She leaves to mourn her loss a father and brother.

July 1, 1889

Married, at the residence of the groom, **J. J. Tschudy, Sr.**, **Mrs. Annie Hoehn**, by Rev. W. Koch on Saturday morning, June 30.

July 7, 1889

Juda, July 2:

The funeral service of **Mrs. T. E. Blackford** was held at the Baptist Church Tuesday afternoon. She died on Monday morning, July 1 at 1:00.

July 8, 1889

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Koli are the proud parents of a baby boy who arrived at their home last Saturday.

Albert Cochran who has been sick for some time, died at his residence this morning, aged 50. He has spent a good share of his life in the past years in the asylum in Madison having been mentally deranged at times. When his last sickness came on him the authorities wanted to take him back to the asylum but his faithful wife objected as the doctors said he could not live very long. Notwithstanding their plea that it would be a terrible task for her to care for him, she told them he must remain and die at home which he did. The funeral will take place from his late residence tomorrow (Tuesday) at 2:30 and his remains will be buried in the Monroe Cemetery.

July 9, 1889

The funeral of the late **A. Cochran** took place this afternoon and was largely attended.

July 10, 1889

On the 4th July, 1889, occurred the 50th anniversary of the marriage of **Wilhelm and Elizabeth Baird** of Sylvester. They were married in 1839 at the residence of the bride's father the late **Joseph Woodie(?) Womble(?)** who then resided where his son **Alpheus** now lives. They have resided where they now live since 1843. Ten children and fifteen grandchildren and one great grandchild with about fifty other relatives and a few neighbors took dinner with them. Mr. Baird was born in Beaver County, Pennsylvania on March 21, 1817. When 13 years of age, his parents removed to Ross County, Ohio. In 1835 he came to Green County with his uncle **Matthew Wells**. Mrs. Baird was born in Fayette County, Pennsylvania on May 30, 1822 and came with her parents to Green County in 1836. There were born unto them ten children all of whom were present at the celebration.

August 5, 1889

Married, by George A. Swartz, J.P., on Friday, August 2, at Clarno, **Floyd H. Hunt** to **Carrie Kegel**, of Freeport, Illinois.

August 7, 1889

A. J. Higt who has been in Milwaukee for some months is visiting his old home in this village. He came here to bid his daughter goodbye before departing for California.

Married on July 31 at Juda by Rev. J. Andereck, **Will Butler** to **Ella Whitney**, both of this village.

August 9, 1889

Mr. and Mrs. Joshua Wells are boasting of a 12 pound baby boy born on the 7th inst. **Mrs. Dr. Bennett** was present with Mrs. Wells at the birth.

Mr. and Mrs. Austin Davis of the south part of town mourn the loss of their little daughter **Nellie** aged a little over two years. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. A. F Lichtenwalner went to Juda to attend the funeral of **Mrs. Fred Kubli**. Mrs. Kubli was a sister to Mrs. Lichtenwalner and leaves a husband and four small children.

August 27, 1889

A sad accident occurred this morning at the I.C. Depot which will result in a brakeman named **William Baltzar** losing his left arm. He entered the spur track at the condensing works after three flat cars with the engine headforemost. He was standing on the pilot holding up the draw bar with his left hand, and when he got to the flats he could not get the pin out of the flat in time and the drawbar and pilot went under the car, catching his left arm between the draw bar on the engine and the car, smashing and mutilating it in a horrible manner. Dr. Loofbarrow was called and did all he could. It was thought best to take the young man to his home in Orangeville where he could be taken care of and his arm amputated. The conductor took the engine and carried the young man to Orangeville on short notice.

September 3, 1889

Jack Saulsby, a brakeman on a train, was killed at Streator, Illinois while coupling cars.

The funeral of **John Gempler's** child of the town of Jordan, who died Sunday, took place at the Lutheran Church in this village this afternoon.

Charles Hart of Minneapolis arrived here on the C.M. and St. Paul Railroad on a visit to his hold time friends, making his home with his nephew **M. A. Morse** and family. The old settlers will remember that Charles had the first drug store in Monroe and the first hotel, the old U.S. House.

September 4, 1889

Reunion of the 5th Wisconsin Battery

A reunion was held in this town on Monday afternoon. Forty four members answered the roll call. The Juvenile Band of Milwaukee volunteered the music for the occasion. Most all of the old settlers in town fell in and acted as escorts for the 5th Battery boys which made a good show, leading the band. They marched up to **H. G. White's** residence where they had their picture taken as a group. The 5th Battery entered the service in 1861 and was discharged in 1865. The remains of **Mr. Hiram Griffin** left this morning for South Haven, Michigan, his old home, for burial. Mr. Griffin was the father of **Mrs. B. L. Wood** of this city and was here with his wife making a visit to his daughter when taken sick. He was some eighty years of age.

December 12, 1889

N. B. Murrey of Albany died Tuesday night and will be buried today at 2:00. He was an old citizen of Green County and highly respected. He was a high Mason and an Oddfellow and a number of these orders left here this morning to be present at his funeral

December 14, 1889

Last night about 11:00 Justice Abbott was aroused from his peaceful slumbers by **Mrs. J. Fetterhoff** to issue a warrant to her husband who came home loaded with booze and gave her a pounding. He is now in jail.
